We were sent by the Japan Baptist Convention in March 2015 and have been doing missionary work in Cambodia for 8 years until March 2023. In April 2023, we received an invitation from CBU (Cambodia Baptist Union) to continue missionary work in Cambodia through the Lord's leading and His Word.

CBU Office Church First time in two months

For the past two months, eight youths have been leading Sunday school on our behalf. They prepare songs, Bible stories, coloring during the service, and coloring pencils. They took an active role in the service, even leading the praise during the worship service. Our sincere thanks to the youth.

We had a brief meeting with these 8 youth after the service to discuss what kind of activities they want to do in the church in the future. This was the first time we had such a meeting. We found out that in addition to the Japanese classes we have been offering, many of the youth are interested in playing musical instruments such as guitar, keyboard, and cajon (drums). We hope to start a "music class" in the near future.

Ministry for supporting women "Threads of Hope" (macrame art) ,new design, Angkor Wat, is finally completed. Below is the story of how it was achieved.

After returning to Japan for the summer, we resumed our activities in August. Khema and Sreymom and we talked about the idea of creating macrame art with a Cambodian design, and we decided on "Angkor Wat," the symbol of Cambodia, as the new design.

Sreymom immediately drafted the design by hand. However, Angkor Wat has a complicated shape. When we made a prototype, it was difficult to express the outline of the building and the design, so we had to create a new weaving method.



It was also quite difficult to balance the left and right towers; the three of us continued to go through trial and error.

In such a situation, God clearly showed us how to knit the difficult parts, and we were able to successfully knit the towers. After about two weeks of trial and error, we were able to express the shape of Angkor Wat in macrame knitting. We thank God for His help and direction. The IJCS church that recently visited Cambodia soon purchased the product. Also, the Cambodian Baptist Theological Seminary purchased them as memorial gifts for their graduation ceremony held in September.

We have also received requests for more colors in our macramé products and for macramé that can be used not only for decoration but also for bags and other practical purposes. We have started trial production of these products. We hope you will remember that in your prayers.

Visiting Ogura Elementary School

In late September, we visited Ogura Elementary School, a public elementary school in Cambodia. Many of our church children attend this elementary school, which is located right next to the "Killing Field". Through the children, we had known about this elementary school for quite some time. However, we did not know that it had a Japanese name, "Ogura," until recently. According to a church member, it must have been named so because a man named "Ogura" helped establish this school.

There are many public schools in Phnom Penh that were built with Japanese financial support. Usually, the Japanese and Cambodian flags are painted side by side on the school buildings of such schools. However, I had never heard of a school with a Japanese name until now. Ever since we learned about "Ogura Elementary School," we have always wanted to visit this school once. Recently, a church member, Khema, contacted the principal and we were finally able to visit.

We asked the principal why the school was named "Ogura". He told us that he did not know the details because it was the previous principal's time, but that it was out of gratitude because Mr. Ogura really gave a lot of support to the school. Unfortunately, Mr. Ogura had already passed away, and the principal did not know any further details.

We believe that God has a mission plan for this elementary school right next to the "Killing field". Please remember us in your prayers.

There are two school buildings on the site, one of which was built in 1998 with the support of Mr. Ogura. The other school building was supported by another Japanese. Other support and donations are still ongoing at the school, such as swings erected with Japanese assistance and an Australian NGO donating trash cans. Thanks to this, the facilities are clearly better than those of other schools. The number of students is also very large, at 1,500. However, there are only 18 teachers, which is very small compared to the number of students. There seems to be a variety of Cambodian backgrounds behind this.

The children answered, "Angkor Wat! . We were deeply moved to know that Angkor Wat is also an important part of their national pride for the children of Cambodia. We sincerely thank the CFF team for visiting the church this time and bringing blessings to the children.

CFF Japan Visiting CBU Office Church

A team of five from the "Caring for the Future Foundation" (CFF) Japan attended the CBU office church service. CFF is an NGO with offices in Japan, the Philippines, Malaysia, and Myanmar. They organize work camps and study tours for children in difficult circumstances. We heard that many young people from Japan have participated in the camps and tours. This time, in preparation for holding a work camp in Cambodia, the team visited Phnom Penh and our church.

Soccer is the sport that both Kross and Ace like and excel at the most, but they are also discovering the importance of teamwork and the joy of improving in volleyball and basketball. School Life of Kross and Ace

Kross and Ace attend Hope International School in Phnom Penh, which started a new term in August, with Kross moving up to the first year of high school and Ace moving up to the first year of junior high school.

Last year, Kross began a two-year course of study in an international curriculum. With an increase in elective courses, he is busier in studies than last school year. Ace, on the other hand, has undergone various changes, such as a new study of Spanish starting this year, and homework seems to have increased. Kross will be preparing for the final exam of the course next May. Please remember them in your prayers.
