We were sent by the Japan Baptist Convention in March 2015 and did mission work in Cambodia for 8 years until March 2023. In April 2023, we received an invitation from CBU (Cambodia Baptist Union) to continue mission work in Cambodia through the Lord's leading and His Word.

However, there is no financial support from CBU, so we pray that we can connect with churches and individuals in Japan in prayer and continue our mission work with specific support.

What is new?

Thank you for your prayers and support... In January and February, Cambodia was affected by air pollution and the PM2.5 (air pollutant) levels were high. There were several days when the air was obviously cloudy and the sky in the distance was blurred and difficult to see clearly. On days when the levels were high, outdoor sports activities at schools were cancelled. By late February, the situation had calmed down considerably and normalcy had returned to normal. Changes in Children's Leaders

Every Sunday, 20 to 30 children, often as many as 40, come together at the church. Among them are children's leaders who serve as group leaders and care for the children of the members. The leaders have become more and more active recently, presenting scripture recitations and special praise during worship services. We started with 7 children leaders, but now we have 15. We thank God that He is raising up each and every child.

However, some of the children who have recently become leaders do not have a good understanding of the role of the leader. The other day, one of the leaders told me that she thought the behavior of some of the leaders was not good. So I gathered the leaders and we discussed it together. Then we found out that there was a dispute among leaders due to some not-so-good words. We were able to confirm together that at such times, it is necessary to remember Jesus' teaching to "love your neighbor" and to show and practice compassion and kindness. I felt that Jesus was present in this discussion and encouraging the child leaders.

Changes in the community

Most of the children come from a village just a short walk from the church. The village is located next to the "Killing Field" the execution site from the Pol Pot regime. During our regular monthly visits to the village, we have noticed changes in the village and the surrounding area.

At first the children became leaders and took on the responsibility of serving because of the reward stamps. These children have been changed by God's love and mercy, and some of them now have more joy in serving God than in receiving stamps.

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind...Love your neighbor as yourself," Matthew 22:37-39. We believe that God will further grow the faith of our children leaders and all the children who gather at our church.

"Thread of Hope" updates

The following is an update on the ministry for supporting Cambodian women, "Thread of Hope". So far, our macrame art products, plant hangers, have been purchased mainly by churches and individuals in Japan. We have been praying to sell more of our products in Cambodia, and we were given a new location: a 10-minute walk from the CBU office church is the "Killing Field". We were given a new location to sell plant hangers at a souvenir shop on the site.

In front of the houses, there is a long unpaved road. On the other side of the road are several vacant lots, which used to be a playground for children. Recently, the lots were developed and new houses were constructed on them. The new houses have been quickly occupied by families moving in from the outskirts of Phnom Penh and from the provinces. Not only in this village, but also in the area surrounding the church, houses and buildings are being built, and



children are also coming to the church from there.

Hope International School, where Kross and Ace attend, held its annual school camp in late February. Each grade, from upper elementary to high school, goes to a different destination for a four-day, three-night camping trip. The Year 10 class, to which Kross belongs, went to Mondulkiri, a province in eastern Cambodia (about 400 km from Phnom Penh, 7 hours by bus), together with the class one grade below. It was a very fulfilling 4 days and 3 nights with various activities such as walking around waterfalls and hiking in the rich nature of Mondulkiri.
